

# **Graduation Survey**

2018-2019 First Destination Report

#### INTRODUCTION

The *First Destination Report* utilizes data from The Ohio State University's Graduation Survey to outline the employment and educational outcomes of students who were awarded degrees in Summer 2018, Autumn 2018 or Spring 2019. The Ohio State University's Graduation Survey is administered by the Office of Student Life to all graduating undergraduate, Master's and professional degree recipients at the end of each term, with the exception of PhD and full-time MBA students who receive separate, national surveys. The survey gathers information about the experiences, satisfaction and future professional plans of graduating students, as well as their permanent contact information.

This report provides a snapshot of student's first destinations after graduation, as reported by commencement.


Students who applied to graduate were invited to take the survey. If students planned to graduate with more than one degree, they received only one invitation. If students planned to graduate with both an undergraduate and graduate degree, they were invited to take a survey specific to Master's/professional students. Graduating students from all campuses were invited to take the survey.


- Undergraduate degree recipients: 11,458 were invited to take the survey and 6,626 responded, for a response rate of 57.8%
  - o Of the undergraduate respondents, 149 earned two bachelor's degrees.
- Master's degree recipients: 2,968 were invited to take the survey and 1,232 responded, for a response rate of 41.5%
  - Of those earning Master's degrees, 10 who responded earned a second Master's degree and 3 earned a professional degree in addition to their Master's degree.
- Professional degree recipients: 828 were invited to take the survey and 293 responded, for a response rate of 35.4%.

#### **HIGHLIGHTS**


- **64.4%** of undergraduate students anticipate that they will work full-time upon graduation and **24.5%** plan to be enrolled in graduate or professional school full-time.
- 82.3% of Master's students anticipate that they will work full-time upon graduation and 12.2% plan to be enrolled in graduate or professional school full-time.
- 89.1% of professional students anticipate that they will work full-time upon graduation.
- Among students who expect to work after graduation, 43.8% of undergraduates, 30.6% of Master's and 69.7% of professional students had accepted a position at the time of the survey.
- Among students who had accepted a position, 19.3% of undergraduates, 13.1% of
  Master's and 2.9% of professional students found their job at a career fair held at Ohio
  State.
- 71.0% of undergraduate students, 60.8% of Master's and 71.3% of professional students participated in an internship or work experience during their degree program. Of those who participated in an internship, 45.9% of undergraduates, 45.7% of Master's and 38.4% of professional students accepted a position with the same organization where they completed their internship.






# What is most likely to be your principal activity upon graduation? Master's (n = 1,206)



# What is most likely to be your principal activity upon graduation? Professional $(n = 285)^1$



### **CAREERS**


Students were asked a series of questions about their careers, including where they would be working and how well Ohio State prepared students for the job market. Among students who planned to work after graduation, 43.8% of undergraduates, 30.6% of Master's and 69.7% of professional students had accepted a position at the time of the survey (within 3 weeks of commencement).

#### UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS

Among graduating students, 25.6% reported that they would be attending graduate or professional school full-time or part-time upon graduation. Among graduating students who had been accepted to graduate school and were attending within the next year, 39.9% were attending The Ohio State University and 60.1% were attending another college or university. Students reported attending a wide range of universities across the country and world.
